The British Government would unquestionably be justified in demanding the reduction of native armaments<sup>1</sup> to these limited requirements. 30. The duties of Native States, however, are not merely negative but positive. They are bound not only to permit the British Government to do everything requisite for the general defence and to abstain from every course of action dangerous to the common safety, but also to co-operate actively to the utmost of their means. It is thus their duty to report to the British Government every threatened invasion of their territories, and to obstruct and oppose to the utmost of their power the passage of an enemy through their limits.<sup>2</sup> They are also required in time of general danger to furnish troops on requisition according to their ability,<sup>3</sup> and to place their resources at the disposal of the British Government. Sometimes the Chiefs are even required to join the army in person. Military service is a general duty following from the subordination of the Native States. It may, however, be limited or qualified by Treaty as, for example, when it is expressly provided that the British Government are to pay for the troops so employed in duties of co-operation or when it has been agreed that the troops of the Native State are liable for service only in particular localities<sup>5</sup> or for specific purposes or that<sup>6</sup> in consideration of the payment for a Subsidiary Force, or the maintenance of a Contingent, the State is not to be called on for further help in time of war. The armies of the Native States then must share the fortunes of the British Government. War cannot be made upon them separately, nor can peace be separately concluded...

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
